An Evolutionary/Revolutionary Month



There was excessive speculation early in November that a Trump win would delay a rate increase but the reaction has made it a near certainty. Trump's spending plans, along with Republican dual control of Congress, caused the market to quickly revise its outlook regarding the pace of Fed rate increases after seeing clear global reflation possibilities.

After one of the biggest price backups on record with the 10-year jumping 0.50%, the initial selloff in the U.S. bond and stock markets stabilized as investors calmed and began instead to look for investment opportunities – and higher rates. The negative reaction in the bond market, which boosted rates to the left of the decimal point, came from fear of a substantial fiscal expansion with pledges to lower taxes, spend more, restrict trade, inflation and higher interest rates. There is little consensus but projected actions foretell tax cuts (or possibly rewrites), a business friendly atmosphere, along with a review and substantial changes to both Dodd-Frank and ACA.

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Several Fed Presidents like Jeffrey Lacker stated that the new projected fiscal policy may require higher interest rates. Chair Yellen's important testimony to the Congressional Joint Economic Committee echoed that sentiment and clearly signaled a December rate hike. She highlighted "recent improvements" and expects continuing growth. A new comment added to her standard speeches noted that "keeping rates on hold could spur excess risktaking." At this time there is no fundamental reason for the Fed to disappoint. Of course the FOMC will want to see a modest continuation of growth.

In the meantime, the *Trumper Tantrum* dip in bond prices has caused pain for existing bondholders and future borrowers. The media did a notable job fueling the flames of fear and are not moderating appreciably, so the volatility will undoubtedly continue.

The constant led a bond selloff around the world initially then settled. The bigger picture is, if the Fed is able to "normalize" with higher interest rates, the benefits will include benefits of income to savers, reduction of pressures on pensions and could encourage banks to do more lending. For now, nothing has changed except we have a new President-elect. Bond yields remain near historic lows and the long-end of the curve is back to where it was at the beginning of the year.



An Reflationary Domestic Trend



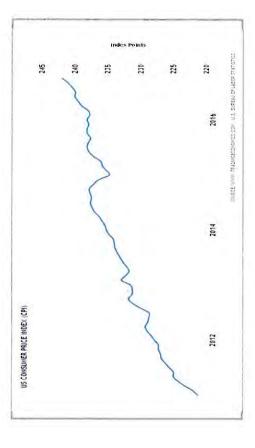
Much of the rate hike talk focuses on inflation which is very much in play. Those applying for a mortgage or selling a house see the downside. But, if you are risk-shy and need higher rates in the portfolio this looks like the end of a long drought.

In general the bond market dreads inflation because it eats up the value of interest. So, up go interest rates in anticipation. Cutting taxes while building infrastructure would mean sending the federal deficit through the roof unless growth takes off. More borrowing by Uncle Sam would put more upward pressure on interest rates. There has to be balance and uncertainty will act to moderate the rates as investors stay short buying a set number of bonds. Another counter pressure will be those international investors who still face extremely low rates in their own sovereign debt.

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Tax cuts provide a little boost to growth. Infrastructure building provides a bigger one, since it puts people directly to work, making steel, building roads, stringing wire and the like. That hiring would come while unemployment is low at 4.9 percent. Layoffs are at a 43-year nadir. Wages were up 2.8% in October, the biggest one-year increase since 2009.

Throughout the economy are signs of growing or potential inflation boosts. US CPI moved up to levels not seen since April 2015 taking the YOY to 1.6% and PPI increased 1.2% over 12 months which is the highest rate in 2 years. And the all important housing starts soared 25.5% bringing it to a nine year high.



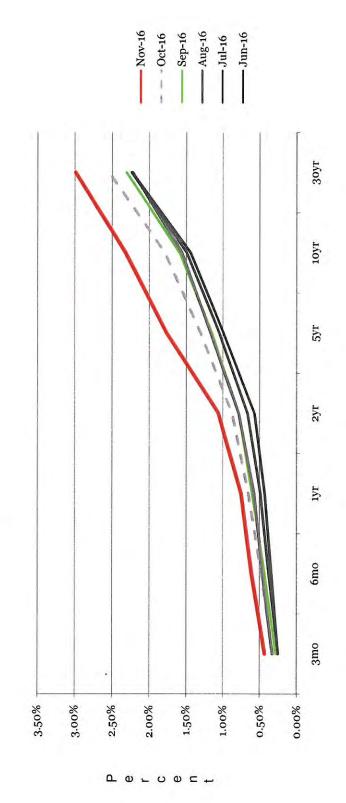
Retail sales showed a solid momentum up 0.8% with strength in both the core and underlying factors. A regional boost came from the business activity gauge in the Empire State (NY) manufacturing survey, the weakest of the recent main regional reports, which improved to +1.5 in November from -6.8 in October, support the inflationary outlook which the Fed has been searching for.

Overseas an inflationary pressure may be introduced if Iran's Oil Minister is correct in noting that it is "highly probable" members will reach an agreement to cut production at the early December OPEC meeting.



Rates are Moving Without the Fed

- Treasury rates soared across the yield curve following the national elections on inflation fears bringing the curve back to beginning year highs when optimism was also bubbling.
- The Federal Reserve is set to raise short-term rates in December probably by a quarter point. The betting now is that rate hikes will be very gradual, but an inflation scare could put the Fed in faster rate hike mode. Then again, all this inflation worry may come to naught. An Evolutionary/Revolutionary Month



There was excessive speculation early in November that a Trump win would delay a rate increase but the reaction has made it a near certainty. Trump's spending plans, along with Republican dual control of Congress, caused the market to quickly revise its outlook regarding the pace of Fed rate increases after seeing clear global reflation possibilities.

After one of the biggest price backups on record with the 10-year jumping 0.50%, the initial selloff in the U.S. bond and stock markets stabilized as investors calmed and began instead to look for investment opportunities – and higher rates. The negative reaction in the bond market, which boosted rates to the left of the decimal point, came from fear of a substantial fiscal expansion with pledges to lower taxes, spend more, restrict trade, inflation and higher interest rates. There is little consensus but projected actions foretell tax cuts (or possibly rewrites), a business friendly atmosphere, along with a review and substantial changes to both Dodd-Frank and ACA.

Several Fed Presidents like Jeffrey Lacker stated that the new projected fiscal policy may require higher interest rates. Chair Yellen's important testimony to the Congressional Joint Economic Committee echoed that sentiment and clearly signaled a December rate hike. She highlighted "recent improvements" and expects continuing growth. A new comment added to her standard speeches noted that "keeping rates on hold could spur excess risk-taking." At this time there is no fundamental reason for the Fed to disappoint. Of course the FOMC will want to see a modest

In the meantime, the *Trumper Tantrum* dip in bond prices has caused pain for existing bondholders and future borrowers. The media did a notable job fueling the flames of fear and are not moderating appreciably, so the volatility will undoubtedly continue.

The constant led a bond selloff around the world initially then settled. The bigger picture is, if the Fed is able to "normalize" with higher interest rates, the benefits will include benefits of income to savers, reduction of pressures on pensions and could encourage banks to do more lending. For now, nothing has changed except we have a new President-elect. Bond yields remain near historic lows and the long-end of the curve is back to where it was at the beginning of the year.





An Reflationary Domestic Trend



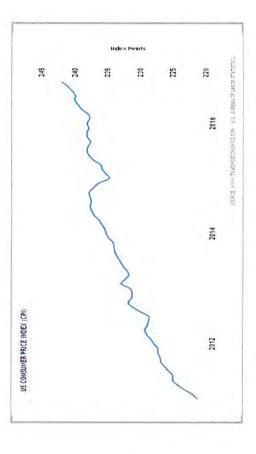
Much of the rate hike talk focuses on inflation which is very much in play. Those applying for a mortgage or selling a house see the downside. But, if you are risk-shy and need higher rates in the portfolio this looks like the end of a long drought.

In general the bond market dreads inflation because it eats up the value of interest. So, up go interest rates in anticipation. Cutting taxes while building infrastructure would mean sending the federal deficit through the roof unless growth takes off. More borrowing by Uncle Sam would put more upward pressure on interest rates. There has to be balance and uncertainty will act to moderate the rates as investors stay short buying a set number of bonds. Another counter pressure will be those international investors who still face extremely low rates in their own sovereign debt.

Tax cuts provide a little boost to growth. Infrastructure building provides a bigger one, since it puts people directly to work, making steel, building roads, stringing wire and the like. That hiring would come while unemployment is low at 4.9 percent. Layoffs are at a 43-year nadir. Wages were up 2.8% in October, the biggest one-year increase since 2009.

Throughout the economy are signs of growing or potential inflation boosts. US CPI moved up to levels not seen since April 2015 taking the YOY to 1.6% and PPI increased 1.2% over 12 months which is the highest rate in 2 years. And the all important housing starts soared 25.5% bringing it to a nine year high.



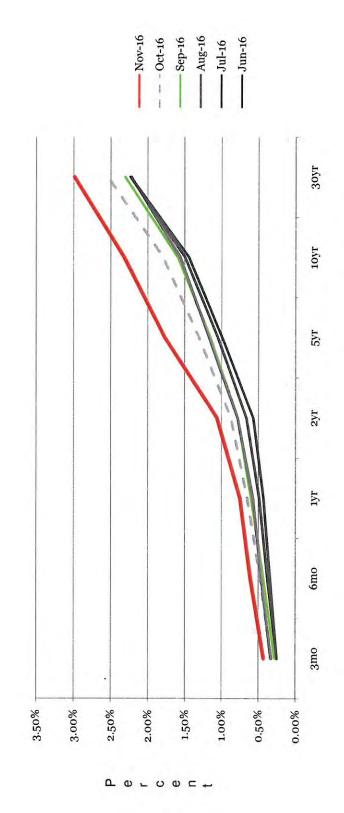
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- The Federal Reserve is set to raise short-term rates in December probably by a quarter point. - I. The meeting was called to order at 4:02 p.m. by committee chair, Marie Flickinger.
- II. Roll Call of Committee Members by Marie Flickinger
 - a. Dan Mims, present.
 - b. Brad Hance, present.
 - c. Keith Sinor, present.
 - d. Other Trustees present: None
- III. Approval of Minutes from the November 29, 2016 Building Committee Meeting
 - a. Marie Flickinger presented the minutes of the November 29, 2016, Building Committee meeting. A motion was made by Keith Sinor to accept the minutes as presented, seconded by Brad Hance. The minutes were approved as presented.
- IV. Recommended Projects and Delivery Methods which will provide the best value to the College
 - a. Consideration of Approval to Award Contract for Construction Manager-at-Risk for North Campus Cosmetology-Culinary Center
 - i. This request provides approval for Tellepsen Builders as the Construction Manager-at-Risk.
 - b. Consideration of Approval to Award Contract for Construction Manager-at-Risk for South Campus Cosmetology Center
 - i. This request provides approval for Brookstone for the Construction Manager-at-Risk. Brookstone is ranked as second in the overall rankings but had the lowest price for services. The first ranking was Tellepsen but there was concern over the number of projects they currently have underway with the College in light of the recommendation above. Tellepsen has performed well on each project so that was not the concern.
 - ii. Discussion of why the College would go with a contractor not used before. Using the second ranking contractor allows for diversity of suppliers, and reduces the risk of using one contractor for all or most of the awarded projects. Additionally, Brenda explained that she reviewed the documentation on the reference checks and all were positive including one was received from IBI Architects which has a long history with the College. Brenda also had a call into the President of Brazosport College to confirm how Brookstone delivered on that

project.

- iii. The committee members would like more information on a proposed process that considers distribution of work among qualified companies including past work with the College. Mr. Lewis will bring this information to the February meeting.
- c. Consideration of Approval of Change Order to Architecture Contract for Central Campus Center for Petrochemical, Energy, and Technology
 - A request was made for consideration of approval to amend the Architect Contract with IBI to provide technical support and design necessary for development of the larger Petrochem construction site, which was not originally included with the building project.
- d. Consideration of Approval to Purchase Architectural Services for South Campus Bruce Student Center Renovation Phase I
 - This request provides for architectural services necessary to renovate the building. This renovation will be conducted in phases since the building will remain occupied.
- e. Ratification of North Campus Baseball Training Facility Substantial Completion
 - i. The building has received fire alarm system approval and final occupancy certification. The ribbon cutting ceremony was conducted last week.
- f. Consideration of Approval to Purchase Testing & Air Balancing (TAB) Services for the North CIT Building Project
 - i. This request is for services of testing & air balancing of the building's HVAC system. Selection of the vendor occurred last fall with a selection of Testing and Balance Services Company.
 - ii. Discussion was held regarding typical process for performing and contracting TAB services. This service is performed for all new and heavily renovated buildings. In the past, this has been done through the GMP (Guaranteed Maximum Price) with the construction contractor. Due to the State changing the law in recent years, the College must procure this service differently than was allowable in the last Bond Program. Committee members asked questions about TAB services being a separate contract and how this changes relates to the contract with Durotech for the North CIT building. Mr. Rizzo and College staff noted that the TAB services was improperly included in the Durotech contract, however, it was noted that the College would receive a credit for this expense in the current contract, and the cost would not be incurred twice. College staff will follow up and provide the Board an update on this item.
- g. Consideration of Approval to Purchase Geotechnical and Material Testing Services for Central Campus Center for Petrochemical, Energy, and Technology
 - i. This request provides for approval to perform geo-technical testing of the soils at the Petrochem building site. This request provides for funding and approval of a consultant for this service.
- V. Reports (Reviewed and in the packet)
 - a. Bond project financial reports were reviewed during Project Updates. Construction

projects report documents were provided to attendees for individual review.

VI. Project Updates

- a. Project 1601 Center for Petrochemical, Energy, & Technology
 - . Design Development phase for the building is nearly completed. The architect, IBI, will present the Design Development package to the Board at a later meeting. Work with the control room design consultant, UCDS (User Centered Design Service), has been started and the results are good. Design is scheduled to be complete in April with the GMP ready for review in May. Construction will then begin in June.
 - ii. Further details provided about the building, working with our industry partners has proved beneficial as they are very impressed. There are vendors indicating they want to donate items or provide at significantly reduced costs. Reconciliation of the square footage and budget must be worked out.
- b. Project 2601 North Baseball Training Facility
 - i. The North Campus Baseball Training Facility received final occupancy certification from the Fire Marshall today.
- c. Project 2909 North Campus Center for Industrial Technology
 - i. The North Campus CIT building will be ready for use beginning after Spring Break, in March.
- d. Project 6803 Maritime Technology and Training Center
 - i. The spray-on insulation under first floor was completed. However, it began to chip and come loose from the concrete floor structure. The contractor is not sure why. They will remove all insulation completely and determine the cause for failure. A plan will be developed and presented to the College for replacement of the insulation. The revised (HVAC) heating coils and VAV (variable air volume) boxes were installed during the winter break and are now operating properly.
- e. Project 2612 North Plant Chiller
 - i. Replacement of chillers is progressing and the temporary chillers are performing adequately while work continues on the main chillers. It is anticipated that the temporary chillers will be used for another two weeks. (A verbal updated was provided to the Board, however no written report was provided on this project.)
- f. 2015 Bond Program Schedule
 - i. North Campus site planning with Facility Programming has gone well with the new site for the Cosmetology-Culinary building is tentatively scheduled to be located on the same site as currently used by the old library. Concerns were expressed by Marie Flickinger and Brad Hance regarding the implications of building on a site that may have subsurface conditions with potential soil or stability issues. The concerns focused on the foundation issues the College experienced at the old library. A hazardous materials study for the old library is being conducted to identify the cause of the foundation failure in the old library and evaluate the viability of the site for any future buildings. The College will

have the findings presented to the committee before any final decisions are made to use the old library site for any new buildings. The demolition of the old library is scheduled to occur in June 2017. South Campus planning is also progressing with the location of the Cosmetology building planned for the northwest end of the Campus, and the Engineering & Technology building to be on the southwest side; east of the Science/Allied Health building. This is a different site plan from that originally conceived for the 2015 Bond Program. Architectural programming for the Cosmetology-Culinary building is planned to complete in February. There are still issues that require work which will be brought to the Building Committee at the next opportunity.

- ii. South Campus Student Center Renovation encompasses two areas. The second floor includes the Registrar and related offices. On the first floor, behind the food services area, Student Services will have additional recreation and student life space included in the design. Kirksey Architects completed the space planning and is moving ahead with design. The goal is to have occupancy by late June.
- iii. Central Campus Welcome Center has gone through the initial architectural programming. The square footage is higher than that in the original 2015 Bond document. This is being reviewed and should be complete in a couple of weeks. The chilled water storage tank is in a location that is close to that projected for the Central Welcome Center. A study is being carried out to determine what should be done with the existing tank.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve an amendment to the 2016-2017 budget for restricted revenue and expenses related to grants.

BACKGROUND

Federal, state, and local grants may require amendments for receipt of newly awarded grants or changes to existing grants. These amendments should be processed in a timely manner in order to provide the access to funding to meet the objectives set forth within the grant requirements. This budget amendment request includes the additions to restricted revenues and restricted expenses as a result of new awards and changes to existing grants received during the month of December 2016 and January 2017.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Approval of the budget amendment will allow the College's staff to implement the programs in accordance with the requirements of funded award amounts.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

Restricted revenues and restricted expenses will each be increased by \$550,719, so there is not any net impact to the College's budgeted restricted net position.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

The Office of Grants Management provides continuous monitoring of grant operations, which are included in the annual financial report to the Board of Trustees.

<u>U.S. Department of Education/Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board - Carl Perkins Career and Technical Education - Basic Grant 2017 (Reallocated Funds)</u>

The Perkins Act defines vocational-technical education as organized educational programs offering sequences of courses directly related to preparing individuals for employment in current or emerging occupations requiring other than a baccalaureate or advanced degree. Programs include competency-based applied learning, which contributes to an individual's academic knowledge, higher-order reasoning, problem solving skills, and the occupational-specific skills necessary for economic independence as a productive and contributing member of society. The most frequent use of funds include: occupationally relevant equipment, vocational curriculum materials, materials for learning labs, curriculum development or modification, staff development, career counseling and guidance activities, efforts for academic-vocational integration, supplemental services for special populations, hiring vocational staff, remedial classes, and expansion of tech prep programs. Funds that are not originally applied for are reallocated to institutions by formula.

<u>Texas Workforce Commission - San Jacinto College in Partnership with a Maritime Consortium</u> (New Grant)

The project will provide training to new and current workers of participating businesses during industry downtime. Upon completion of training, the business partners expect their participant employees to have updated workforce skills that meet U.S. Coast Guard standards, regulations, and certification requirements. Tangible goals for the business partner's relationship with employees are increased employee loyalty, retention, performance, and productivity. Ultimately this project will provide promotion opportunities for employees. Project participants must be full-time employees from one of the business partners and the partner businesses must be current contributors of Texas Unemployment Insurance Taxes.

<u>Texas Workforce Commission - Apprenticeship Training Program (Additional Funds)</u>
The purpose of the Apprenticeship Training Program grant is to fund a portion of the costs associated with job-related classroom instruction in a registered apprenticeship. Registered apprenticeships are structured systems of job training to prepare individuals for occupations in skilled trades and other occupations. A registered apprenticeship combines on-the-job training under the supervision of experienced journey workers with job related classroom instruction.

Bill and Helen Crowder Foundation - San Jacinto College Concert Series 2016 (New Grant)
The Central Campus Concert Series fills an unmet need in the Gulf Coast, East Houston region.
It provides a season of diverse, high-quality, professional music presentations that primarily serve the local area. Concerts are free or at a minimal cost and are open to the public. Workshops held in tandem with the performance include intense master classes for San Jacinto College students. Participants have responded with enthusiasm, interest, and renewed inspiration.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve the articulation agreement with Grambling State University.

BACKGROUND

Grambling State University combines the academic strengths of a major university with the benefits of a small college. They offer more than 800 courses and 47 degree programs in five colleges, including an honors college, two professional schools, and a graduate school. National and local employers recruit graduates from Grambling's excellent nursing, computer science, teacher education, and other programs. It is one of the country's top producers of African American graduates and the top producer of Computer Information Science grads in Louisiana. Their motto is "Where Everybody is Somebody."

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Grambling State University offers San Jacinto College graduates who have earned an associate degree and maintained a GPA of 2.0 or higher guaranteed admission. Once students have been admitted, all transfer credits will be evaluated for acceptance into the University by the designated academic department. Each student must be in good academic standing to gain admittance. The institutions shall develop transfer plans for business, computer information systems, computer science, and criminal justice.

Both institutions enter into this agreement in the spirit of cooperation and mutually recognize each other as quality institutions of higher education. Each institution is dedicated to serving students from diverse populations.

Articulation Agreement between

San Jacinto Community College District and Grambling State University

The San Jacinto Community College District (SJCD) and Grambling State University (Grambling) have developed this agreement to support student achievement of educational and career goals. The agreement represents an active educational partnership committed to student success and degree completion.

This agreement provides for the seamless transfer of credit from SJCD to Grambling (articulation) and from Grambling to SJCD (reverse articulation). This agreement also defines parameters by which SJCD and Grambling may mutually consent to program or degree specific articulation plans to be covered and enforced by the scope of this agreement.

SJCD is authorized to offer instructional programs leading to various associate degrees and to confer the appropriate associate degree on students successfully completing such programs. All such programs are registered with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. SJCD is regionally accredited by and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). The SJCD has its principle place of business at 4624 Fairmont Parkway, Pasadena, Texas 77504.

Grambling is authorized to offer instructional programs leading to various baccalaureate degrees and to confer the appropriate baccalaureate degree on students successfully completing such programs. All such programs are registered with the Louisiana Board of Regents. Grambling is regionally accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Grambling has its principle place of business at 403 Main Street, Grambling, Louisiana 71245.

Articulation of Credit

Students may apply for admission to Grambling at any time during their enrollment at SJCD; the Grambling application and admission fee will be waived for students transferring under this agreement.

SJCD students must meet all Grambling requirements and deadlines pertaining to application for admission, orientation and registration, and payments of tuition and fees, other than application and admission fees. SJCD students seeking transfer to Grambling shall abide by the policies and procedures in effect at the time of their application to Grambling, that apply to all students of and/or applicants to Grambling.

SJCD students earning an Associate of Arts, an Associate of Arts in Teaching, an Associate of Science, or an Associate of Science in Engineering Science with a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or greater and transferring under this agreement will be guaranteed admission to Grambling under this agreement. A maximum of 66 semester credit hours earned at SJCD with a grade of C or better will be accepted and applied to a designated/appropriate Grambling degree plan.

SJCD students earning an Associate of Applied Science degree and who have completed all requirements of the SJCD core curriculum with a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or greater will be guaranteed admission to Grambling under this agreement. A maximum of 89 semester credit hours earned at SJCD with a grade of C or better will be accepted and credited toward a designated/appropriate applied bachelor's degree plan at Grambling. Of the maximum 89 semester credit hours to be accepted by Grambling, 42 semester credit hours must satisfy SJCD core curriculum requirements; the remaining 47 semester credit hours may include courses identified by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM) and/or Workforce Education Course Manual (WECM).

All successfully completed, with a grade of C or better, lower-division academic courses offered by SJCD, identified by the Texas Common Course Numbering System (TCCNS), and published in the Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM) shall be fully transferable to Grambling and be substituted for the equivalent course at Grambling.

Unless otherwise specified by an articulation plan approved under this agreement, SJCD students may be required to apply and be admitted separately to specific colleges or programs within Grambling and be subject to all requirements and limitations of admission procedures to said programs including higher GPA requirement and/or additional specific courses as stated in the course catalog in effect at the time of enrollment at Grambling. Grambling shall not place requirements on SJCD students transferring under this agreement that are not required of its native students.

SJCD and Grambling will work together to provide students with accurate and timely transfer information and academic advising relative to a designated/appropriate Grambling degree program. Grambling will provide appropriate brochures and informational material to SJCD and its students. Grambling shall provide support services appropriate to meet the needs of SJCD transfer students, including an orientation program similar to that which is provided to Grambling native students and shall finalize an approved degree plan prior to completion of the SJCD student's second semester of study at Grambling.

Reverse Articulation of Credit

The purpose of Reverse Articulation of Credit is to serve SJCD students who transfer to Grambling prior to earning an associate's degree from SJCD. Reverse articulation of credit permits eligible and interested students to transfer certain course work from Grambling to SJCD to complete requirements for an associate's degree.

For students who transfer from SJCD to Grambling prior to earning an associate's degree, all successfully completed lower-division academic courses offered by SJCD, identified by the Texas Common Course Numbering System (TCCNS), and published in the Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM) shall be fully transferable to Grambling and be substituted for an equivalent course.

At the time of student application to Grambling, Grambling will notify students of the purpose of this agreement and the reverse articulation of credit, will ask students to indicate their interest in the reverse articulation of credit to SJCD, and will notify students of the likelihood that Grambling will share transcript information with SJCD.

Each September or at other appropriate intervals agreed upon by the parties, Grambling will review its student records and determine which students are eligible for the reverse articulation of credit by applying the following criteria: (i) the Grambling student previously transferred coursework from SJCD, (ii) the student has indicated an interest in reverse articulation of credit and (iii) the student completed at least 24 semester credit hours at SJCD. Grambling will securely transmit official paper or electronic copies of these students' transcripts to SJCD.

Upon receipt of Grambling transcript information, SJCD will conduct a degree audit of each eligible student and evaluate all coursework that may apply to the completion of the student's associate degree at SJCD. Students who meet all SJCD degree requirements are eligible to receive an SJCD degree at no additional cost to the student. SJCD will notify each student that he or she is eligible to receive an associate's degree and eligible to participate in SJCD's graduation ceremony.

Separate academic records for students will be maintained at each institution. Authorized employees of SJCD and Grambling will have access to personally identifiable information about the students who receive or who are eligible for reverse articulation of credit. SJCD and Grambling will ensure their institutional compliance with FERPA regulations.

Articulation Plans

This agreement establishes general articulation and reverse articulation of credit. Successful transfer and degree completion requires the mapping of credits from specific SJCD associate's degree programs to specific Grambling bachelor's degree programs. Educational planners and advisers at SJCD and Grambling rely on two types of documents to facilitate and support transfer and articulation of credit from SJCD to Grambling: transfer plans and articulation plans

Transfer plans are documents that describe the articulation of credit granted to any student from any institution when transferring to Grambling. The transfer plans between SJCD and Grambling clarify how SJCD credits transfer to Grambling based on existing program and degree requirements and state regulations. Transfer plans are developed as a matter of supporting student advising; they do not require formal recognition under this agreement.

Articulation plans are also transfer plans, but they are more formal and may identify specific admission conditions to be accepted into a program or degree plan at Grambling and may describe articulation of credit not guaranteed by transfer plans or state regulations. Articulation plans are developed specifically and uniquely to articulate credit from SJCD to Grambling; articulation plans developed in accordance with this agreement are guaranteed by this mutual agreement between the two institutions.

Pursuant to and in support of this agreement, individual articulation plans may be established that specify which requirements of specific Grambling degree plans are satisfied by specific SJCD courses and credits.

To establish an articulation plan under the legal scope of this agreement, SJCD and Grambling shall:

 Describe, where appropriate, any application and admission requirements specific to the Grambling degree plan to which the SJCD student plans to transfer.

- Indicate an effective start date and end date for the articulation plan.
- List all course requirements for the Grambling degree plan and indicate which SJCD courses shall satisfy each requirement. Individual courses required as part of the Grambling and SJCD core curriculum shall not be listed; that group of courses shall be noted by a single heading of Core Curriculum. It is understood by both parties to this agreement that those institutions of higher education, as defined by Section 61.003 of the Texas Education Code, which are subject to the jurisdiction of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board are required to accept for transfer all courses within the approved core curriculum of any fellow institution of higher education. Pursuant to the terms of this agreement, SJCD and Grambling further agree that, in the event that Grambling is not an institution of higher education subject to the jurisdiction of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, SJCD and Grambling shall also accept for transfer the core curriculum adopted by the parties to this agreement.
- Conduct a review of all aforementioned details. Reviewers shall include: an instructional administrator with responsibility for the relevant degree program; an educational planner or advisor or enrollment management administrator; and an administrator responsible for managing this articulation agreement.
- Reviewers shall indicate by paper or electronic signature their approval of the articulation plan.

Individual articulation plans may be independently terminated according to the terms of this agreement. Termination of individual articulation plans does not affect the status of the agreement or other individual articulation plans established under this agreement.

If an articulation plan expires or is terminated for any reason while SJCD students are enrolled at Grambling and pursuing a degree under that articulation plan, Grambling must allow students to pursue the degree under the agreed upon articulation plan as long as the student is enrolled continuously at least part-time through Fall and Spring semesters.

General

<u>Term</u>. This agreement is for a period of five (5) years from the date that it is signed by the authorized representatives of both institutions. This agreement shall automatically renew for one (1) year terms unless terminated pursuant to the provisions set forth herein.

<u>Voluntary Termination</u>. This agreement may be terminated by either party by giving written notice of said party's intentions to the SJCD Office of the Vice Chancellor for Learning and/or to the Grambling<relevant academic official> at least 90 days prior to the date on which action would be taken. Such a notice will specify the nature of the action contemplated and the rationale for such action.

<u>Accreditation.</u> This agreement is effective only as long as both SJCD and Grambling maintain current accreditation by a regional accrediting association as recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. In the event that either party loses accreditation, this agreement shall terminate immediately.

<u>Phase-Out.</u> In the event this agreement is terminated, SJCD and Grambling will continue to provide support and services to students transferring under this agreement as long as students are enrolled continuously at least part-time through Fall and Spring Semesters.

<u>Agreement Status & Review.</u> The respective designees at both SJCD and Grambling will monitor and report on the status and impact of this agreement. As long as this agreement is in effect, the agreement and any subsequent articulation plans should be reviewed annually or bi-annually and revised or amended as necessary.

<u>FERPA Regulations.</u> SJCD and Grambling agree to comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) (20 U.S.C §1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) and its associated regulations, taking steps to ensure that confidential information is not disclosed or distributed in a manner inconsistent therewith. This provision shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

<u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement embodies the entire agreement and understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements, whether oral or written between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof.

Modifications or Amendments. This Agreement may not be amended or modified except by a written instrument executed by both parties. SJCD and Grambling agree to mutual notification of changes and additions to the curriculum and curriculum standards, so that articulation plans may be revised as necessary. Proposed changes in policies or curriculum by either party must be communicated in writing to the other party and agreed upon in consultation with officials of each institution. Any changes agreed upon must be signed by both parties, dated, and attached to this agreement.

Notices and Requests. All notices given pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be validly given on (1) the date of delivery if delivered by email, facsimile transmission, registered or certified mail, or hand delivered, or (2) three (3) business days after being mailed via United States Postal Service addressed as follows:

<u>Force Majeure</u>. Neither party shall be liable for any delays resulting from acts of nature, strikes, and riots, acts of war, epidemics, or governmental regulations.

<u>Publicity</u>. Neither party hereto shall, without securing written or electronic consent of the other party, publicly announce the existence of this Agreement or advertise or release any publicity in regard thereto, except that SJCD and Grambling may disclose the terms of this Agreement to the extent required by law or regulation.

<u>Binding Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of Grambling and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of San Jacinto Community College District's legal representatives, successors, and assigns.

<u>Severability</u>. If any of the provisions or portions of this Agreement are invalid under any applicable statute or rule of law, they are to that extent to be deemed omitted.

<u>Assignment</u>. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, neither party shall assign or transfer any of its rights or obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party hereto, which assignment shall not be unreasonably withheld, and any such attempted assignment without such consent shall be void.

No Financial Implication. No financial implications concerning the transfer or exchange of cash, equipment, or real estate is intended or implied by this agreement. SJCD and Grambling are separate and independent institutions of higher education and intend to remain so. The administrators of Grambling and SJCD are authorized to prepare and implement plans of action and procedures necessary to effect this agreement.

Independent Contractor. Each party acknowledges and agrees that the relationship with each other is that of an independent contractor and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create a partnership, joint venture or agency relationship between the parties. Each party is solely responsible for any and all liabilities of its employees for their performance under this Agreement and further is responsible any and all taxes imposed upon each party, including FICA, FUTA, unemployment taxes, worker's compensation coverage, and other liabilities incurred as the employer providing products and/or services pursuant to this Agreement as an independent contractor.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, each of the parties hereto has caused this Agreement to be executed on its behalf by its duly authorized representative.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

WHEREAS, San Jacinto Community College District will implement the provisions of the Voting Rights Act regarding language of minority groups, pursuant to the provisions of Section 55.1 through 55.24 of U.S.C.A., when required, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that SAN JACINTO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT prepare and arrange for the electronic voting systems, voting machines, and voting equipment, printing the ballots and acquisition of voting supplies, determining the voting places and the placing of the names of the candidates on the ballots.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Trustees of SAN JACINTO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT:

- 1. That a general election shall be held in said San Jacinto Community College District on May 6, 2017, for the purpose of electing Two (2) trustees/members to positions on the Board of Trustees, with the term of office being six (6) years each for Positions One (1), and Two (2).
- 2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned elections shall be in writing and filed with the Secretary of the Board of Trusteesin Room 200, of the Thomas S. Sewell District Administration Building, 4624 Fairmont Parkway, Pasadena, Texas 77504, beginning January 18th, 2017 until February 17, 2017, during normal business hours Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. until noon and from 1:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. The last day for said requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot shall be 5:00 p.m. on February 17th, 2017, when filing for all positions shall be closed.

Drawing by lot for a place on the ballot by the candidates or their representatives will be at 5:15 p.m. February 21st, 2017 in Room 104, of the Thomas S. Sewell District Administration Building, 4624 Fairmont Parkway, Pasadena, Texas 77504.

- 3. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the San Jacinto Community College District, per the provisions of Section 31.123 of the Texas Election Code, hereby appoints and designates Mrs. Ginger Lambert as his agent/chief election official and Mr. Chet Lewis, as alternateagent to perform those duties provided by said section of the Texas Election Code.
- 4. That said election shall be held within the San Jacinto Community College District's voting precincts as designated by the Texas Election Code. The Election Judges, Alternate Election Judges and Voting Clerks shall be designated and appointed by the agent for the Secretary of the Board of Trustees prior to May 6, 2017.
- 5. That it is hereby determined by this Board that voting in said elections shall be by the use of electronic voting systems, voting machines, and voting equipment, and the ballot forms and ballot cards of said elections shall conform to the provisions of the Texas Election Code.
- 6. The manager/presiding judge for the Central Counting Station for the tabulation and counting of ballots shall be Mrs. Ginger Lambert. The Tabulation Supervisor shall be Mini Izaguirre and Assistant Tabulation Supervisor is Susana Gonzalez.

The Early Voting In Person shall begin on Monday, April 24th, 2017 and end on Tuesday May 2nd, 2017 at the designated early voting locations established within the San Jacinto Community College District jointly established and designated by the entities which San Jacinto Community College District jointly established and designated by the entities which San Jacinto Community College District, Deer Park Independent School District, City of Deer Park, La Porte Independent School District/City of La Porte, PasadenaIndependent School District, City of Pasadena, City of Shoreacres, City of Morgan's Point. Hours for the joint polling locations will be established by the Joint Interlocal Election Agreement. ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve modifications to the College's incidental and lab fee schedule to be effective for the Fall 2017 semester.

BACKGROUND

The proposed fee changes have been recommended and approved through the Fall 2016 curriculum process. All curriculum revisions including incidental and laboratory fees are reviewed and approved by the College's Curriculum Steering Committee, Instruction and Student Services Council, and Provosts.

New fees are either due to new course offerings or additional course requirements that necessitated establishment of new fees. Fees modifications result from either increased or reduced lab requirements, changes in accreditation requirements, or increases in certification fees charged on a headcount basis. In some cases, previously charged fees are no longer required and a recommendation is being made to remove them.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Adoption of the fee recommendations will establish new course fees, modify existing fees, or delete existing fees. The majority of the fees will become effective in the Fall 2017 semester, with the exception of those that are specifically noted.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The recommended fee changes do not impact the current 2016-2017 budget. Revenue for net impact of fees changes will be included in the 2017-2018 budget. There are no staffing implications to this recommendation.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

Review of incidental and lab fees occurs on an annual basis.

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ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve the Partnership Agreement between San Jacinto College and Houston Independent School District (HISD) for the delivery of college courses for dual credit students and confidential student data sharing.

BACKGROUND

Houston Independent School District (HISD) approached the College with interest in allowing high school students to participate in technical programs where the students could earn dual credit and a Certificate of Technology and/or an Associate of Applied Science prior to high school graduation. HISD administrators have met with the Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Success Partnerships, the Central Campus Technical Dean, and the Process Technology Department Chair to create these opportunities for students in specific HISD high schools.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

This agreement includes the dual credit tuition and fee waiver (75%) and additional language required for the confidential sharing of student level data. This action will allow Chavez High School students to enroll in a plan of study allowing them to complete a Level II Certificate of Technology in Process Technology beginning in the spring semester of 2017. The first class of students is anticipated to be a cohort of about 20 students. Additional technical programs may be added with other high schools in the future.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

None anticipated at this time.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

Progress of the students in this program will be reported to the HISD Career and Technical Education office each semester and to the Board of Trustees of the College as appropriate.

PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT BETWEEN SAN JACINTO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND HOUSTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR

OFFERING COLLEGE CREDIT COURSES TO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS FOR

THE AWARDING OF SIMULTANEOUS COLLEGE AND HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT AND CONFIDENTIAL STUDENT DATA SHARING

This PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT for college courses for simultaneous college and high school credit and confidential student data sharing is made by and between SAN JACINTO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT (SJCCD) and the HOUSTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT (HISD).

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, SJCCD and HISD desire to enter into the following described Partnership Agreement, to wit: "Partnership Agreement between SJCCD and HISD for Offering College Credit Courses to High School Students for the Awarding of Simultaneous College and High School Credit and Confidential Data Sharing (Partnership Agreement)";

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Partnership Agreement is to develop and expand a partnership between SJCCD and HISD to develop programs, projects, and activities that will address college persistence challenges for students from low-income families who are also often first-generation college students.

WHEREAS, the primary objectives of the partnership are to:

- Establish a program whereby students in HISD can enroll in college coursework face-toface or online with SJCCD for the simultaneous awarding of college and high school credit (also known as DUAL CREDIT);
- Achieve a 50% 3-year graduation or transfer rate for HISD alumni who enroll at SJCCD;
- Attract more HISD students to SJCCD where they will have the opportunity to excel academically and contribute as leaders on campus and in the larger community;
- Provide opportunities for the leadership and staff of both HISD and SJCCD to meet and create new strategies to address the challenges of college faced by students from lowincome families who are also often first-generation college students;

WHEREAS, student data is being requested pursuant to the Partnership Agreement to be shared with both and between HISD and SJCCD;

NOW THEREFORE, SJCCD and HISD agree as follows:

I. COLLEGE COURSES OFFERED FOR DUAL CREDIT

Pertinent rules for administration of partnerships for simultaneous awarding of college credit to fulfill high school graduation requirements are contained in the Texas Administration Code (TAC), TITLE 19, PART 1, CHAPTER 4, SUBCHAPTER D, RULE §4.85.

A) Eligible Courses

- Courses offered for dual credit by public two-year associate degree granting
 institutions must be identified as college-level academic courses in the current edition
 of the Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual adopted by the Texas Higher
 Education Coordinating Board (THECB) or as college-level workforce education
 courses in the current edition of the Workforce Education Course Manual adopted by
 the THECB.
- 2) SJCCD may not offer remedial or developmental courses for dual credit.
- 3) SJCCD shall coordinate enrollment of HISD students in Technical or Workforce Development courses at the college through the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Office of HISD.

B) Student Eligibility

- 1) A high school student in HISD is eligible to enroll in **academic** college courses for dual credit, if the student:
 - a) demonstrates college readiness by achieving the minimum passing standards under the provisions of the Texas Success Initiative as set forth in TAC 19, §4.57 (relating to College Ready and Adult Basic Education (ABE) Standards) on relevant section(s) of an assessment instrument approved by the Board as set forth in TAC 19, §4.56 (relating to Assessment Instrument); or
 - b) demonstrates that he or she is exempt under the provisions of the Texas Success Initiative as set forth in TAC 19, §4.54 of this title (relating to Exemptions, Exceptions, and Waivers).
- 2) A high school student is also eligible to enroll in academic dual credit courses that require demonstration of TSI college readiness in reading, writing, and/or mathematics under the following conditions:
 - a) Courses that require demonstration of TSI college readiness in reading and/or writing:
 - (i) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by the Texas Education Agency (TEA), on the English II State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness End of Course (STAAR EOC); or
 - (ii) if the student achieves an allowable score on the new PSAT yet to be determined
 - (iii)if the student achieves an allowable score on the ACT Aspire yet to be determined
 - b) Courses that require demonstration of TSI college readiness in mathematics:
 - (i) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by TEA, on the Algebra I STAAR EOC, and a passing grade in the Algebra II course; or

- (ii) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by TEA, on the Algebra II STAAR EOC; or
- (iii)if the student achieves an allowable score on the new PSAT yet to be determined
- (iv) if the student achieves an allowable score on the ACT Aspire yet to be determined
- 3) A high school student is eligible to enroll in workforce education dual credit courses contained in a Level 1 certificate program or a program leading to a credential of less than a Level 1 certificate, at a public junior college or public technical institute and shall not be required to provide demonstration of college readiness or dual credit enrollment eligibility.
- 4) A high school student is eligible to enroll in workforce education dual credit courses contained in a Level 2 certificate or applied associate degree program under the following conditions:
 - a) Courses that require demonstration of TSI college readiness and/or writing:
 - (i) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by TEA, on the English II STAAR EOC; or
 - (ii) if the student achieves an allowable score on the new PSAT yet to be determined
 - (iii)if the student achieves an allowable score on the ACT Aspire yet to be determined
 - b) Courses that require demonstration of TSI college readiness in mathematics:
 - (i) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by TEA, on the Algebra I STAAR EOC and passing grade in the Algebra II course; or
 - (ii) if the student achieves a Level 2 final recommended score, as defined by TEA, on the Algebra II STAAR EOC; or
 - (iii)if the student achieves an allowable score on the new PSAT yet to be determined
 - (iv) if the student achieves an allowable score on the ACT Aspire yet to be determined
 - c) A student who is exempt from taking TAKS or STAAR EOC assessments may be otherwise evaluated by an institution to determine eligibility for enrolling in workforce education dual credit courses.
- 5) To be eligible to enroll in a college course offered by a public college, students must meet all of the college's regular prerequisite requirements designated for that course (e.g., minimum score on a specified placement test, minimum grade in a specified prerequisite course, etc.).
- 6) To remain eligible for continued dual credit enrollment, students must pass all courses with a grade of C or better in order to enroll for subsequent coursework. Students who do not meet this criteria are subject to the rules regarding Academic Warning, Probation, and Suspension, found in the SJCCD Catalog accessible at

- 7) An institution may impose additional requirements for enrollment in college courses offered for dual credit that do not conflict with this section referenced above, including but not limited to pre-requisite requirements for certain programs and courses.

C) Location of Class

College courses for dual credit may be taught on the college campus or on the high school campus. For college courses taught exclusively to high school students on the high school campus and for college courses taught electronically, SJCCD will comply with applicable THECB rules and procedures for offering courses at a distance. In addition, college courses taught electronically shall comply with the THECB's adopted Principles of Good Practice for Courses Offered Electronically.

D) Student Composition of Class

College courses taught for dual credit may be composed of dual credit students only or of dual and college credit only students.

E) Faculty Selection, Supervision, and Evaluation

- SJCCD shall select instructors of dual credit courses. These instructors must be
 regularly employed faculty members of the SJCCD or must meet the same standards
 (including minimal requirements of the Southern Association of Colleges and
 Schools) and approval procedures used by the college to select faculty responsible for
 teaching the same courses on the SJCCD campuses.
- 2) The college shall supervise and evaluate instructors of dual credit courses using the same or comparable procedures used for faculty at the SJCCD campuses.

F) Course Curriculum, Instruction, and Grading

The college shall ensure that a college course taught for dual credit at a site other than one of the SJCCD campuses and the same course offered on one of the campuses of SJCCD are equivalent with respect to the curriculum, materials, instruction, and method/rigor of student evaluation. These standards must be upheld regardless of the student composition of the class.

G) Academic Policies and Student Support Services

- Regular academic policies applicable to courses taught at one of SJCCD's campuses
 must also apply to college courses taught for dual credit in any other location. These
 policies include the appeal process for disputed grades, drop policy, the
 communication of grading policy to students, when the syllabus must be distributed,
 etc.
- 2) Students enrolled in college courses offered for dual credit must be eligible to utilize the same or comparable support services that are afforded to college students on the SJCCD campuses. The college is responsible for ensuring timely and efficient access to such services (e.g., academic advising and counseling), to learning materials (e.g., library resources), and to other benefits for which the students may be eligible.

H) Transcripting of Credit

For college courses taught for dual credit, high school as well as college credit will be transcripted immediately upon a student's successful completion of the performance required in the course.

I) Tuition, Materials, and Transportation Services

- 1) HISD students enrolled in college courses at SJCCD campuses or at an HISD high school will be charged the appropriate tuition and/or fee rate based on the residency requirements of the State of Texas.
- 2) SJCCD will waive 75% of the appropriate tuition and fees for college courses taken for dual credit by each HISD student. The remaining 25% of the tuition and fees will be paid by HISD.
- 3) HISD shall provide transportation to and from SJCCD campuses for students enrolled in college courses for dual credit.
- 4) HISD will cover the expense of all learning materials for HISD students enrolled in SJCCD courses offered for dual credit.

J) Funding

- The state funding for college courses taught for dual credit will be available to both public school districts and colleges based on the current funding rules of the State Board of Education and the THECB.
- 2) SJCCD may only claim funding for college courses taken by dual credit students when those courses are in the SJCCD Core Curriculum, are Workforce and Technical Education courses, and foreign language courses, for which the students will receive both high school and college credit.

K) Term

The term of this Agreement shall be from the Effective Date through August 31, 2019, unless renewed or earlier terminated as set forth herein.

L) Termination

This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other Party. However, any cohort of HISD students taking SJCCD college courses for dual credit at the time the Agreement is effectively terminated by either party will be allowed to complete those courses notwithstanding the terminate of the Agreement.

II. SHARED CONFIDENTIAL STUDENT DATA

A) Nature of Shared Data

- 1) SJCCD agrees that the data transferred from HISD to the College is and shall remain the sole and exclusive property of HISD. HISD agrees that the data transferred from SJCCD to the HISD shall remain the sole and exclusive property of SJCCD.
- 2) This Partnership Agreement establishes that data that deals with confidentiality provisions of the Patient Safety Rule shall not be released by either party. Data that are released must be used consistent with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), and HISD and SJCCD policies and procedures for managing student education records and other confidential information.

3) HISD grants SJCCD, and SJCCD grants HISD, permission to use such data only for the following purpose and for no other purpose: to track current HISD students who earned credit in a college course offered for dual credit, or have graduated or completed a sequence of courses leading to certification, licensure, or an Associate Degree from SJCCD while maintaining dual enrollment at HISD.

B) Scope of Shared Data

The scope of the data sharing between HISD and SJCCD addressed in this MOU is limited to the following:

- 1) Student Identifier
 - a) First Name, Last Name, Middle Initial
 - Public Education Information Management System ("PEIMS") Identifier or HISD student identifier
 - c) Date of Birth (DOB)
- 2) Semester End Date
- 3) College Courses Offered for Dual Credit Enrollment Information
 - a) SJCCD Student Identification Number (G#)
 - b) Course Name
 - c) Course Rubric and Course Number
 - d) Semester Grade
- 4) Associate Degree Earned (Y/N)
- 5) License Awarded (Y/N)
- 6) Certificate Awarded (Y/N)
- 7) If "yes" to 4, 5, 6, provide Type or Program Name

C) Format of Data Sharing

A portion of the relevant student data shall be provided by HISD to SJCCD and a portion of the data shall be provided by SJCCD to HISD. The data shall be provided in the following format: either Microsoft Excel or Access. Any data received by either party pursuant to the Partnership Agreement shall be destroyed when it is no longer needed for the designated purpose.

D) Ensuring Confidentiality of Data

HISD and SJCCD shall maintain the confidentiality of any and all student data exchanged pursuant to the Partnership Agreement. The confidentiality requirements under this paragraph shall survive the termination or expiration of the Partnership Agreement or any subsequent agreement intended to supersede the Partnership Agreement. To ensure the continued confidentiality and security of the student and staff data processed, stored, or transmitted under the Agreement, HISD and SJCCD shall establish a system of safeguards that shall at a minimum include doing the following:

a) HISD and SJCCD shall develop, implement, maintain, and use appropriate administrative, technical, and physical security measures to preserve the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of all data, including electronicallymaintained or transmitted data received from, or on behalf of each other. These

- measures shall be extended by contract to all subcontractors used by HISD and SJCCD.
- b) HISD and SJCCD employees, subcontractors, and agents involved in the handling, transmittal, and/or process of data provided under the Agreement shall be required to maintain the confidentiality of all student and staff-related personally identifiable information.
- c) HISD and SJCCD shall develop and implement procedures and systems that require the use of secured passwords to access computer databases used to process, store, or transmit data provided under the Agreement.
- d) HISD and SJCCD shall develop and implement procedures and systems, such as good practices for assigning passwords, to maintain the integrity of the systems used to secure computer databases used to process, store, or transmit data provided under the Agreement.
- e) HISD and SJCCD shall develop and implement procedures and systems that ensure that all confidential student and staff data processed, stored, and/or transmitted under the provisions of the Agreement shall be maintained in a secure manner that prevents the interception, diversion, or other unauthorized access to said data.
- f) HISD and SJCCD shall develop and implement procedures and systems to process, store, or transmit data provided under the Agreement that ensure that any and all disclosures of confidential student and staff data comply with all provisions of federal laws (FERPA, Government, etc.) and Texas state laws relating to the privacy rights of students and staff as such laws are applicable to the parties of the agreement.
- g) SJCCD shall return to HISD all data or any portions thereof requested by HISD, or, at HISD's election, SJCCD shall destroy all or any part of HISD's data that is within the possession or control of SJCCD and shall, upon request by HISD, provide certification of such destruction. HISD shall return to SJCCD all data or any portions thereof requested by SJCCD, or, at SJCCD's election, HISD shall destroy all or any part of SJCCD's data that is within the possession or control of HISD and shall, upon request by SJCCD, provide certification of such destruction.
- h) SJCCD shall obtain permission from HISD prior to publications or disclosure of relevant data, or other uses not outlined in the Agreement, by SJCCD. HISD shall obtain permission from SJCCD prior to publications or disclosure of relevant data, or other uses not outlined in the Agreement, by HISD.

III. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

A) Relationship of Parties

It is understood and agreed that SJCCD is a separate legal entity from HISD and neither it, nor any of its employees, volunteers, or agents contracted by it, shall be deemed for any purposes to be employees or agents of HISD. SJCCD and its contractors assume full responsibility for the actions of their personnel and volunteers

while performing any services incident to this Agreement, and shall remain solely responsible for their supervision, daily direction and control, payment of salary (including withholding of income taxes and social security), workers' compensation, disability benefits and like requirements and obligations. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create any third party beneficiaries or otherwise give any third party any claim or right of action against any party to this Agreement.

B) No Waiver of Immunity

Neither HISD nor SJCCD waives or relinquishes any immunity or defense on behalf of itself, its trustees, officers, employees, and agents as a result of its execution of this Agreement and performance of the functions or obligations described herein.

C) Authorization of Agreement

Each party represents and warrants to the other that the execution of this Agreement has been duly authorized, and that this Agreement constitutes a valid and enforceable obligation of such party according to its terms.

D) No Waiver

No waiver of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall be construed to be a waiver of any breach of any other provision. No delay in acting with regard to any breach of any provision shall be construed to be a waiver of such breach.

E) Notice

Any notice required to be given under the provisions of this Agreement, shall be in writing and shall be duly served when it shall be hand-delivered to the addressees set out below, or shall have been deposited, duly registered or certified, return receipt requested, in a United States Post Office addressed to the other part at the following addresses:

Either party may designate a different address by giving the other party ten (10) days prior written notice in the manner provided above.

F) No Assignment

No assignment of this Agreement or of any duty or obligation or performance hereunder, shall be made in whole or in part by either party without the prior written consent of the other party.

G) Section Headings

The headings of sections contained in this Agreement are for convenience only, and they shall not, expressly or by implication, limit, define, extend, or construe the terms or provisions of the sections of this Agreement.

H) Governing Law

This Agreement is made in Texas and shall be construed, interpreted, and governed by the laws of such state. The parties irrevocably consent to the sole and exclusive jurisdiction and venue of the courts of Harris County, Texas, for any action under this Agreement.

I) Originals

This Agreement may be executed in separate counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be an original, but all of such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument.

J) No Personal Liability

Nothing in this Agreement may be construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer, director, employee, or agent of SJCCD or HISD, and the parties expressly agree that the execution of this agreement does not create any personal liability on the part of any officer, director, employee, or agent of SJCCD or HISD. The parties shall be responsible for their own acts of negligence.

These provisions are solely for the benefit of the parties hereto and not for the benefit of any person or entity not a party to this Agreement. No provisions shall be deemed a waiver of any defenses available by law, including, but not limited to, governmental immunity.

K) Criminal History Background Check Requirements

Pursuant to Sections 22.0834 and 22.085 of the Texas Education Code, the SJCCD hereby certifies that all employees, contractors, and volunteers of SJCCD who are hired by SJCCD on or after January 1, 2008, and who have continuing duties related to the Agreement; and have or will have direct contact with students, have passed a national criminal history background record information review as required by those sections.

SJCCD shall send or ensure that its employees, contractors, and volunteers send to the Texas Department of Public Safety ("DPS") information that is required by the DPS for obtaining national criminal history record information, which may include fingerprints and photographs. DPS shall obtain the person's national criminal history record information and report the results through the criminal history clearinghouse as provided by Section 411.0845, Government Code.

SJCCD must also obtain certifications from all contractors that their employees to whom Section 22.0834 applies have also passed a national criminal history background record information review.

SJCCD must also provide assurances that all of its employees, contractors, and volunteers, including those hired before January 1, 2008, who have contact with students have passed a criminal history background check current within the last year. If an employee, contractor, or volunteer of SJCCD has a criminal conviction or has received deferred adjudication for a felony offense or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, the District may elect not to enter into this Contract, or cancel the Contract.

WARNING: Section 44.034 of the Texas Education Code requires that a person or business entity that enters into a contract with a school district must give advance notice to the district if the person or an owner or operator of the business entity has been convicted of a felony. The notice must include a general description of the conduct resulting in the conviction of a felony. The District may terminate this Contract if the district determines that the person or business entity failed to give notice as required by Section 44.034(a) or misrepresented the conduct resulting in the conviction.

L) Records Retention and Audits

Both HISD and SJCCD are subject to the requirements of the record retention laws of the State of Texas.

M) Student Records

To the extent that SJCCD will come into possession of student records and information, and to the extent that SJCCD will be involved in the survey, analysis, or evaluation of students, incidental to this Agreement, SJCCD agrees to comply with all applicable requirements of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). The parties contemplate entering into a Memorandum of Understanding preserving the confidentiality of any and all student data exchanged as part of this Agreement.

N) Texas Public Information Act

Both HISD and SJCCD are subject to the requirements of the Texas Public Information Act.

O) Business Ethics

During the course of pursuing Agreements, and the course of Agreement performance, SJCCD will maintain business ethics standards aimed at avoiding real or apparent impropriety or conflicts of interest. No substantial gifts, entertainment, payments, loans, or other considerations beyond that which would be collectively categorized as incidental shall be made to any employees or officials of HISD, its authorized agents and representatives, or to family members of any of them. At any time SJCCD believes there may have been a violation of this obligation, SJCCD shall notify HISD of the possible violation. HISD is entitled to request a representation letter from SJCCD, its subcontractors or Contractors at any time to disclose all things of value passing from the SJCCD, its subcontractors or contractors to HISD's personnel or its authorized agents and representatives.

P) Confidential and Proprietary Information

The parties may provide technical information, documentation, and expertise to each other that is either (1) marked as being confidential, or (2) if delivered in oral form, is

summarized in writing within 10 working days and identified as being confidential ("Confidential Information"). The receiving party shall for a period of five (5) years from the date of disclosure (i) hold the disclosing party's Confidential Information in strict confidence, and (ii), except as previously authorized in writing by the disclosing party, not publish or disclose the disclosing party's Confidential Information to anyone other than the receiving party's employees on a need-to-know basis, and (iii) use the disclosing party's Confidential Information solely for performance of this Agreement. The foregoing requirement shall not apply to any portion of a party's Confidential Information which (a) becomes publicly known through no wrongful act or omission on the part of the receiving party; (b) is already known to the receiving party at the time of the disclosure without similar nondisclosure obligations; (c) is rightfully received by the receiving party from a third party without similar nondisclosure obligations (d) is approved for release by written authorization of the disclosing party; (e) is clearly demonstrated by the receiving party to have been independently developed by the receiving party without access to the disclosing party's Confidential Information; or (f) is required to be disclosed by order of a court or governmental body or by applicable law, provided that the party intending to make such required disclosure shall promptly notify the other part of such intended disclosure in order to allow such party to seek a protective order or other remedy.

Q) Debarment and Suspensions

SJCCD certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it is not presently debarred, suspended for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any federal department or agency.

R) Complete Understanding

This Agreement shall constitute the complete understanding of SJCCD and HISD, and may not be modified in any manner without the express written consent of both parties and supersedes any other representations, agreements, arrangements, negotiations, or understanding, oral or written, between the parties to this Agreement.

By signing the Agreement, SJCCD affirms that there is no personal or financial conflict of interest between SJCCD employees and contractors or their families and the District.

This Agreement is executed in counterparts, each of which shall have the full force and effect of an original Agreement, and each of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve the articulation agreement with Southern New Hampshire University—College of Online and Continuing Education (SNHU-COCE).

BACKGROUND

Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) is a private, nonprofit, accredited institution with more than 3,000 on-campus students and over 60,000 online students, making us one of the fastest-growing universities in the country. SNHU was founded in 1932. They provide affordable, accessible education that students can pursue on their 300-acre campus in Manchester, NH, or at their regional centers in Manchester, Portsmouth and Brunswick, ME. They are seeking an articulation agreement for students interested in their innovative online platform. Articulation Agreement between

San Jacinto Community College District and

Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education

The San Jacinto Community College District (SJCD) and Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education (SNHU-COCE), have developed this agreement to support student achievement of educational and career goals. The agreement represents an active educational partnership committed to student success and degree completion.

This agreement provides for the seamless transfer of credit from SJCD to *SNHU-COCE* (articulation) and from *SNHU-COCE* to SJCD (reverse articulation). This agreement also defines parameters by which SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* may mutually consent to program or degree specific articulation plans to be covered and enforced by the scope of this agreement.

SJCD is authorized to offer instructional programs leading to various associate degrees and to confer the appropriate associate degree on students successfully completing such programs. All such programs are registered with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. SJCD is regionally accredited by and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). The SJCD has its principle place of business at 4624 Fairmont Parkway, Pasadena, Texas 77504.

SNHU-COCE is authorized to offer instructional programs leading to various baccalaureate degrees and to confer the appropriate baccalaureate degree on students successfully completing such programs. SNHU-COCE is regionally accredited by and is a member of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC) through its Commission on Institutions of Higher Education (CIHE). The SNHU-COCE has its principle place of business at 33 South Commercial Street, Manchester, NH 03101.

Articulation of Credit

Students may apply for admission to *SNHU-COCE* at any time during their enrollment at SJCD; the *SNHU-COCE* application and admission fee will be waived for students transferring under this agreement.

SJCD students must meet all *SNHU-COCE* requirements and deadlines pertaining to application for admission, orientation and registration, and payments of tuition and fees, other than application and admission fees. SJCD students seeking transfer to *SNHU-COCE* shall abide by the policies and procedures in effect at the time of their application to SNHU-COCE that apply to all students of and/or applicants to *SNHU-COCE*.

SJCD students earning an Associate of Arts, or an Associate of Science, or an Associate of Applied Science with a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or greater and transferring under this agreement will be guaranteed admission to SNHU-COCE under this agreement. A

maximum of 90 semester credit hours earned at SJCD with a grade of C- or better will be accepted and applied to a designated/appropriate *SNHU-COCE* degree plan if the coursework aligns with the bachelor's degree program.

Of the maximum 90 semester credits to be accepted by SNHU-COCE, SNHU-COCE will identify the remaining courses beyond the associate degree (AA, AS, AAS) for the aligned bachelor's degree program.

All successfully completed, with a grade of C- or better, lower-division academic courses offered by SJCD, identified by the Texas Common Course Numbering System (TCCNS), and published in the Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM) shall be fully transferable to *SNHU-COCE* and be substituted for the equivalent course at *SNHU-COCE*.

Unless otherwise specified by an articulation plan approved under this agreement, SJCD students may be required to apply and be admitted separately to specific colleges or programs within *SNHU-COCE* and be subject to all requirements and limitations of admission procedures to said programs including higher GPA requirement and/or additional specific courses as stated in the course catalog in effect at the time of enrollment at *SNHU-COCE*. *SNHU-COCE* shall not place requirements on SJCD students transferring under this agreement that are not required of its native students.

SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* will work together to provide students with accurate and timely transfer information and academic advising relative to a designated/appropriate *SNHU-COCE* degree program. *SNHU-COCE* will provide appropriate brochures and informational material to SJCD and its students. *SNHU-COCE* shall provide support services appropriate to meet the needs of SJCD transfer students, including an orientation program similar to that which is provided to *SNHU-COCE* native students and shall finalize an approved degree plan prior to completion of the SJCD student's second semester of study at *SNHU-COCE*.

Reverse Articulation of Credit

The purpose of Reverse Articulation of Credit is to serve SJCD students who transfer to Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education prior to earning an associate's degree from SJCD. Reverse articulation of credit permits eligible and interested students to transfer certain course work from SNHU-COCE to SJCD to complete requirements for an associate's degree.

For students who from SJCD to *SNHU-COCE* prior to earning an associate's degree, all successfully completed lower-division academic courses offered by SJCD, identified by the Texas Common Course Numbering System (TCCNS), and published in the Lower Division Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM) shall be fully transferable to *SNHU-COCE* and be substituted for an equivalent course if the course fits into the appropriate bachelor's degree program at SNHU-COCE.

Southern New Hampshire University will allow SJCD students to transfer their credits earned at SNHU-COCE back to SJCD, as part of this articulation agreement, and provide them the opportunity to complete their community college (associate) degree. SNHU students will <u>automatically</u> be notified of this Agreement, when they have met the following criteria:

- Have earned at least 30 semester college credit hours from SJCD
- Have earned at least 36 semester college credit hours from SNHU.
- Transferred to SNHU with SJCD being the last school attended.
- Be in "good standing" at both SJCD and SNHU.
- Attended SJCD within the last 5 years.
- Student Completion of the Reverse Transfer Credit Agreement release form
- SNHU-COCE will securely transmit official paper or electronic copies of these students' transcripts to SJCD.

Upon receipt of *SNHU-COCE* transcript information, SJCD will conduct a degree audit of each eligible student and evaluate all coursework that may apply to the completion of the student's associate degree at SJCD. Students who meet all SJCD degree requirements are eligible to receive an SJCD degree at no additional cost to the student. SJCD will notify each student that he or she is eligible to receive an associate's degree and eligible to participate in SJCD's graduation ceremony.

Separate academic records for students will be maintained at each institution. Authorized employees of SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* will have access to personally identifiable information about the students who receive or who are eligible for reverse articulation of credit. SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* will ensure their institutional compliance with FERPA regulations.

Articulation Plans

This agreement establishes general articulation and reverse articulation of credit. Successful transfer and degree completion requires the mapping of credits from specific SJCD associate's degree programs to specific *SNHU-COCE* bachelor's degree programs. Educational planners and advisers at SJCD and *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education* rely on two types of documents to facilitate and support transfer and articulation of credit from SJCD to *SNHU-COCE*: transfer plans and articulation plans

Transfer plans are documents that describe the articulation of credit granted to any student from any institution when transferring to *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education*. The transfer plans between SJCD and *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education* clarify how SJCD credits transfer to *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education* based on existing program and degree requirements and state regulations. Transfer plans are developed as a matter of supporting student advising; they do not require formal recognition under this agreement.

Articulation plans are also transfer plans, but they are more formal and may identify specific admission conditions to be accepted into a program or degree plan at *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education* and may describe articulation of credit not guaranteed by transfer plans or state regulations. Articulation plans are developed specifically and uniquely to articulate credit from SJCD to *Southern New Hampshire University-College of Online and Continuing Education*; articulation plans developed in accordance with this agreement are guaranteed by this mutual agreement between the two institutions.

Pursuant to and in support of this agreement, individual articulation plans may be established that specify which requirements of specific *SNHU-COCE* degree plans are satisfied by specific SJCD courses and credits.

To establish an articulation plan under the legal scope of this agreement, SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* shall:

- Describe, where appropriate, any application and admission requirements specific to the SNHU-COCE degree plan to which the SJCD student plans to transfer.
- Indicate an effective start date and end date for the articulation plan.
- List all course requirements for the SNHU-COCE degree plan and indicate which SJCD courses shall satisfy each requirement. Individual courses required as part of the SNHU-COCE and SJCD core curriculum shall not be listed; that group of courses shall be noted by a single heading of Core Curriculum. It is understood by both parties to this agreement that those institutions of higher education, as defined by Section 61.003 of the Texas Education Code, which are subject to the jurisdiction of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board are required to accept for transfer all courses within the approved core curriculum of any fellow institution of higher education. Pursuant to the terms of this agreement, SJCD and SNHU-COCE further agree that, in the event that SNHU-COCE is not an institution of higher education subject to the jurisdiction of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, SJCD and SNHU-COCE shall also accept for transfer the core curriculum adopted by the parties to this agreement.
- Conduct a review of all aforementioned details. Reviewers shall include: an
 instructional administrator with responsibility for the relevant degree program; an
 educational planner or advisor or enrollment management administrator; and an
 administrator responsible for managing this articulation agreement.
- Reviewers shall indicate by paper or electronic signature their approval of the articulation plan.

Individual articulation plans may be independently terminated according to the terms of this agreement. Termination of individual articulation plans does not affect the status of the agreement or other individual articulation plans established under this agreement.

If an articulation plan expires or is terminated for any reason while SJCD students are enrolled at *SNHU-COCE* and pursuing a degree under that articulation plan, *SNHU-COCE* must allow students to pursue the degree under the agreed upon articulation plan as long as the student is enrolled continuously at least part-time through Fall and Spring semesters.

General

<u>Term</u>. This agreement is for a period of five (5) years from the date that it is signed by the authorized representatives of both institutions. This agreement shall automatically renew for one (1) year terms unless terminated pursuant to the provisions set forth herein.

<u>Voluntary Termination</u>. This agreement may be terminated by either party by giving written notice of said party's intentions to the SJCD Office of the Associate Vice Chancellor for Learning and/or to the *SNHU-COCE Assistant Director of Academic Alliances* at least 90 days prior to the date on which action would be taken. Such a notice will specify the nature of the action contemplated and the rationale for such action.

<u>Accreditation.</u> This agreement is effective only as long as both SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* maintain current accreditation by a regional accrediting association as recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. In the event that either party loses accreditation, this agreement shall terminate immediately.

<u>Phase-Out.</u> In the event this agreement is terminated, SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* will continue to provide support and services to students transferring under this agreement as long as students are enrolled continuously at least part-time through Fall and Spring Semesters.

<u>Agreement Status & Review.</u> The respective designees at both SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* will monitor and report on the status and impact of this agreement. As long as this agreement is in effect, the agreement and any subsequent articulation plans should be reviewed annually or bi-annually and revised or amended as necessary.

<u>FERPA Regulations.</u> SJCD and SNHU-COCE agree to comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) (20 U.S.C §1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) and its associated regulations, taking steps to ensure that confidential information is not disclosed or distributed in a manner inconsistent therewith. This provision shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

<u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement embodies the entire agreement and understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements, whether oral or written between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof.

<u>Modifications or Amendments.</u> This Agreement may not be amended or modified except by a written instrument executed by both parties. SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* agree to mutual notification of changes and additions to the curriculum and curriculum standards, so that articulation plans may be revised as necessary. Proposed changes in policies or curriculum by either party must be communicated in writing to the other party and agreed upon in consultation with officials of each institution. Any changes agreed upon must be signed by both parties, dated, and attached to this agreement.

Notices and Requests. All notices given pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be validly given on (1) the date of delivery if delivered by email, facsimile transmission, registered or certified mail, or hand delivered, or (2) three (3) business days after being mailed via United States Postal Service addressed as follows:

<u>Force Majeure</u>. Neither party shall be liable for any delays resulting from acts of nature, strikes, and riots, acts of war, epidemics, or governmental regulations.

<u>Publicity</u>. Neither party hereto shall, without securing written or electronic consent of the other party, publicly announce the existence of this Agreement or advertise or release any

publicity in regard thereto, except that SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* may disclose the terms of this Agreement to the extent required by law or regulation.

<u>Binding Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of *SNHU-COCE* and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of San Jacinto Community College District's legal representatives, successors, and assigns.

<u>Governing Law</u>. Harris County, Texas shall be the proper place of venue for suit on or in respect of the Agreement. The Agreement and all of the rights and obligations of the parties hereto and all of the terms and conditions hereof shall be construed, interpreted and applied in accordance with and governed by and enforced under the laws of the State of Texas.

<u>Severability</u>. If any of the provisions or portions of this Agreement are invalid under any applicable statute or rule of law, they are to that extent to be deemed omitted.

<u>Assignment</u>. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, neither party shall assign or transfer any of its rights or obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party hereto, which assignment shall not be unreasonably withheld, and any such attempted assignment without such consent shall be void.

No Financial Implication. No financial implications concerning the transfer or exchange of cash, equipment, or real estate is intended or implied by this agreement. SJCD and *SNHU-COCE* are separate and independent institutions of higher education and intend to remain so. The administrators of *SNHU-COCE* and SJCD are authorized to prepare and implement plans of action and procedures necessary to effect this agreement.

Independent Contractor. Each party acknowledges and agrees that the relationship with each other is that of an independent contractor and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create a partnership, joint venture or agency relationship between the parties. Each party is solely responsible for any and all liabilities of its employees for their performance under this Agreement and further is responsible any and all taxes imposed upon each party, including FICA, FUTA, unemployment taxes, worker's compensation coverage, and other liabilities incurred as the employer providing products and/or services pursuant to this Agreement as an independent contractor.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a Construction Manager-at-Risk (CMR) contract with Tellepsen Builders, L.P. (Tellepsen) to construct the new North Campus Cosmetology-Culinary Center.

BACKGROUND

In October 2016, the Board granted approval to use the Construction Manager-at-Risk delivery method for the North Campus Cosmetology-Culinary Center.

A two-step solicitation process, Project Number 17-06, was utilized to procure these services in accordance with the Texas Government Code, Section 2269.251. A request for qualifications (RFQ), the first phase of the two-step process, was issued on November 14, 2016 and submittals were received from thirteen (13) firms. Evaluation and ranking of the submittals was based on criteria published in the RFQ. On December 6, 2016, the five highest-ranked firms were asked to submit a response to a Request for Proposals (RFP), the second phase of the two-step process. In addition, each firm made a presentation to the evaluation committee on December 14, 2016. The five finalists were ranked using numerical assessments from each segment and Tellepsen earned the highest overall score.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Approval of this request will authorize a contact with Tellepsen to construct the new North Campus Cosmetology-Culinary Center. The scope of work for the project will include a mix of classroom, conference, lab, public interface and administrative space for the Cosmetology and Culinary programs. Additionally, the new facility will provide appropriate air ventilation and conditioning as necessary to conduct safe and effective cosmetology activities, as well as culinary teaching and serving activities.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The total estimated project cost is \$22,845,000. The price for the duration of the project are, pending successful contract negotiations, not to exceed the preconstruction fee of \$20,000, estimated general conditions of \$880,595, and the construction management fee of 1.75%, for a total estimated contractor contract value of \$1,188,750.

The project's guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for construction will be developed as design and construction plans progress.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

Design and construction of the new building will require approximately twenty-one (21) months. Following detailed design and bidding, a GMP will be brought to the Board for

consideration. Design and construction will be monitored by the College's Facilities Services personnel. Program management will be conducted by AECOM.

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a Construction Manager-at-Risk (CMR) contract with Brookstone Construction (Brookstone) to construct the new South Campus Cosmetology Center.

BACKGROUND

In October 2016, the Board granted approval to use the Construction Manager-at-Risk delivery method for the South Campus Cosmetology Center.

A two-step solicitation process, Project Number 17-08, was utilized to procure these services in accordance with the Texas Government Code, Section 2269.251. A request for qualifications (RFQ), the first phase of the two-step process, was issued on November 14, 2016 and submittals were received from eleven (11) firms. Evaluation and ranking of the submittals was based on criteria published in the RFQ. On December 7, 2016, the five highest-ranked firms were asked to submit a response to a Request for Proposals (RFP), the second phase of the two-step process. In addition, each firm made a presentation to the evaluation committee on December 14, 2016. The five finalists were ranked using numerical assessments from each segment. Brookstone offered the lowest overall price for the project resulting in an estimated cost savings of \$65,822 over the next lowest price proposal. Brookstone was determined to offer the most favorable proposal of all pre-qualified firms to reach the best value for the College.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Approval of this request will authorize a contract with Brookstone to construct the new South Campus Cosmetology Center. The scope of work for the project will include a mix of classroom, conference, lab, public interface and administrative space for the Cosmetology program. Additionally, the new facility will provide appropriate air ventilation and conditioning as necessary to conduct safe and effective cosmetology activities.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The total estimated project cost is \$16,213,000. The price for the duration of the project are, pending successful contract negotiations, not to exceed the preconstruction fee of \$58,650, estimated general conditions of \$690,000, and the construction management fee of 1.95%, for an estimated total contract value of \$976,527.

The project's guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for construction will be developed as design and construction plans progress.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

Design and construction of the new building will require approximately twenty-one (21) months. Following detailed design and bidding, a Guaranteed Maximum Price will be brought to the Board for consideration. Design and construction will be monitored by the College's Facilities Services personnel. Program management will be conducted by AECOM.

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a contract to purchase ophthalmic diagnostic equipment from Carl Zeiss Meditec, Inc. (Zeiss) for the Central Campus Eye Care Technology department.

BACKGROUND

An invitation for bids, Project Number 17-09, was issued to procure ophthalmic diagnostic equipment. Two responses were received and the bid submitted by Carl Zeiss Meditec, Inc. was determined to be both responsible and responsive to all solicitation requirements. Zeiss was the only vendor who could provide both units included in the solicitation request. The two machines to be purchased include an automated perimeter with liquid lens technology and the spectral domain optical coherence tomography (OCT) machine.

The automated perimeter with liquid lens technology is the industry standard for the future of perimetry testing. The purchase of the Zeiss perimeter will allow for replacement of the current perimeter machine, located in the Eye Care Technology department, which is 28 years old, has outdated software, a printer that is no longer operational and is beyond repair. College faculty will be able to use the new equipment to train students on the latest technology using the industry standard equipment they will encounter upon graduating and entering their field of study. The College has not previously had an OCT machine in the department for students to train on. Faculty had to rely on students gaining useable knowledge of this equipment as part of their clinical experience. Access to Zeiss OCT in the classroom will add to the performance of the program due to more enhanced training opportunities available through use of the in-house equipment.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

The Commission on Accreditation of Ophthalmic Medical Programs require accredited programs include in their curriculum and performance objectives that include to test and record using an automated perimeter and perform and record scanning computer ophthalmic diagnostic imaging using an OCT machine. Along with the Eye Care Technology program meeting the accreditation standards, this purchase will allow students more hands-on training and experience in proper eye imaging techniques.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The expenditure is \$79,478 and will be funded by Perkins grant funds.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

The award is a one-time purchase and will be delivered and operational by March 10, 2017.

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a change order to the contract with IBI Group, Inc. (IBI) for additional design services in connection with the Center for Petrochemical, Energy, and Technology at the Central Campus (Petrochem).

BACKGROUND

In July 2015, the Board approved a contract with IBI to provide architectural design services for the Petrochem center. The original agreement was executed effective December 2015.

In July of 2016, a Central Campus site master plan was completed and presented to the Board that described the future placement of buildings and traffic flows associated with the Central Campus. Within this plan, the proposed Petrochem building was placed at the southwest corner of the Central Campus. This placement provided an opportunity for a signature visual presence along the Fairmont Parkway roadway and from the Pasadena Convention Center.

The proposed change order will provide authorization for additional design services necessary to develop the unimproved building site, allowing for construction of the Petrochem building complex at the southwest corner of the Central Campus. This location does not have utilities and related services readily available and the design services will address incoming and outgoing utilities, and vehicle traffic entrances and exits.

Architectural services are classified as professional services pursuant to Section 2254 of the Texas Government Code.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Approval of this expense will provide the related professional design services needed for the associated utilities and traffic infrastructure of the Petrochem building. In order to secure building permits, provisions must be made to supply the site with storm water containment, electrical power substation, domestic water connections, natural gas supply, College data connections and traffic thoroughfares and connections to existing roadways. The design services are necessary because the current site does not have existing the utility infrastructure required to support this building.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

This request will increase the contract amount by an amount not to exceed \$157,300. This expenditure will be funded by the 2015 Bond Program.

Kirksey Architects, Inc. was deemed best suited for design services of the South Campus Bruce Student Center renovation project. The proposed renovation will be carried out in the east half of second floor and portions of the west half of the first floor. Subsequent renovation phases will be developed and sequenced through the duration of the South Campus 2015 Bond Program.

Architectural services are classified as professional services pursuant to Section 2254 of the Texas Government Code and are awarded based on the firm's qualifications relative to each project.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

This requested action provides for design of the first phase of the South Campus Bruce Student Center renovation. This renovation project is part of the 2015 Bond Program and includes interior space reconfiguration and renovation as necessary to meet current College business needs, and to renew the systems and interiors of the Bruce Student Center in order to continue operations.

The renovation work will be conducted in phases as the building will remain in use during the entire 2015 Bond Program. Extensive planning and communications will be carried out with occupants and campus leadership to assure a safe environment and minimal impact to College operations.

IV.	2015-2016 Comprehensive Annual	Chet Lewis, Elissa Posway, Mini Izaquirre, Bill Dickerson, and Anita Dewease were present for this item.	
	Financial Report (CAFR)	Chet Lewis introduced Elissa Posway with Doeren Mayhew. Elissa distributed the Audit Results document. She gave an overview of the audit process and findings.	
		 Elissa stated that with respect to the audit, Doeren Mayhew was required to report the following items: Significant Accounting Policies – The College adopted GASB Statement no. 72, during fiscal year 2016, which had no impact on financial statement amounts and minimal impact on disclosures. Significant audit adjustments – None Major disagreements with management – None Material errors, fraud, and illegal acts – None Required material written communications will be completed after Board approval of audit Single audit results can be reviewed beginning on page 77 of the draft CAFR or on page five of the audit results handout 	
		Elissa summarized that there were no findings to be reported. Marie Flickinger asked about page 28 of the audit. She asked if the estimate that we will not recoup is approximately a third of the student receivables of \$23,530,298. Chet explained that there is aging that goes into the calculations and estimates. The total amount of student receivables is accumulated for up to four years in the report. Chet's team explained that the College continues to collect on student balances and holds are placed on student accounts as long as a student owes the College money.	
		Dr. Ruede Wheeler asked who the audits go to. Elissa explained that these go into the data collection center to become official open documents. Chet explained that the reports are also submitted to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, bond rating agencies and related entities, grants agencies, and The State receive audit by January 1. Additionally, it is used in the SACSCOC reaffirmation, and it is uploaded on the College website.	

		Chet reviewed significant points from the draft audit report. He thanked the auditors and the fiscal affairs team for their contributions on a clean audit.
V.	Part-time Faculty and Staff Rate Increases	The action item was distributed to the Board for review and questions. Dr. Hellyer asked if the Board had any questions. They had no questions.
VI.	Performance Management Distribution Curves	A presentation of the 2015-2016 performance rating distribution curves were distributed to the Board for review. Steve Trncak gave an overview of the key points of the presentation. Keith asked how many non-renewals we have because of this. Steve did not have that exact number but it was less than five this year. Dr. Wheeler asked if employees disagree with their evaluations and is there a process to review these complaints. Steve explained that there is a secondary review process in place. Brenda said we are also doing leadership development in order to hold all accountable. There is a two way conversation constantly between leaders and direct reports throughout the process.
VII.	85 th Legislative Session	Teri Crawford was present for this item. Brenda briefly explained the handouts and the potential impacts to San Jacinto College of the proposed legislature. Brenda explained that she and Teri Crawford have been and will continue to meet with our elected officials. Updates will be provided to the Board throughout the legislative session.
VIII.	Election Calendar	Danny Snooks was present for this item. Brenda explained that the calendar is included in the Board's folder. The first day to file for a place on the ballot is January 18 and the last date is February 17 at 5:00 p.m. The election order will be on the agenda for the Board meeting on January 30.

		Danny Snooks explained that Position 1 and 2 are up for election in May 2017. He explained that if there is any desire for an incumbent to seek office for another elected position, there is not a requirement to resign from the San Jacinto College Board. If the incumbent is elected to the other office, he/she then would be required to vacate the trustee position. Dr. Wheeler asked that if a position is vacated during a Board members term, if the Board has the option to appoint. Danny explained that the Board can appoint in the event of a vacated position.
